PDX in Motion

Our city's growth is a continuing issue for the many citizens that rely on local public services and infrastructure for daily living. Housing needs the most attention as it should, but transportation is a close

Due to Portland's expected growth over the next fifteen years, the number of households in the Central City is expected to double and employment will increase by fifty percent. The Central City is only three percent of Portland's land area, but it will absorb thirty percent of the city's population growth. These statistics demand major changes to the transportation infrastructure in the Central City

Forty percent of the land area of downtown is composed of streets and sidewalks making their expansion difficult, if not impossible. Since automobiles use ninety-five percent of the street area and bicycles and transit use only five percent, it seems reasonable that the more efficient forms of alternative transportation should

increase since it is the only way to move

By comparison, in Copenhagen bicycle users make sixty-two percent of the inner city trips yet they use only seven percent of the road area.

Six years ago, Portland Bureau of Transportation began planning for the not too distant future. The Central City in Motion (CCIM) report was adopted by resolution before City Council in mid-November. This program plans to create a better city based on a generation of planning that requires a coordinated, far reaching agenda of projects to meet the challenges of Portland's future growth.

The plans will involve creating thirty miles of low stress bikeways, oe hundred safe street crossings, additional miles of transit investments, and improving traffic flow throughout the Central City for an investment of \$72 million over ten years.

To the north, Seattle has experienced even larger growth than Portland and has made numerous changes addressing these difficult issues. They have made significant investments in pedestrian safety, protected bike lanes, and dedicated bus lanes in order to accommodate new ways to get in and out of their central city.

Their work has resulted in a ten percent reduction in drive-alone commuting while the number of jobs increased by 60,000. Seattle's transit ridership is growing faster than any other city in the country.

Portland hopes to accomplish similar transportation improvements with the Central City in Motion program beginning with eighteen projects planned over the next five years, some of which affect the Central Eastside Industrial District.

SE / NE Grand Ave. will see improvements made to help facilitate the movement of autos, bikes, and transit. There will be new pedestrian crossings at Martin Luther King Blvd. and Grand Ave.: protected bike lanes on 7th Ave. to connect Sullivan's Crossing to the Tilikum Bridge; and 6th Ave. is a likely location of a section of the future Green Loop, that will include additional pedestrian crossings. The cost is estimated at \$8.5 million.

While Portland Bureau Transportation has been collecting data since last July about whether scooters help or harm by decreasing car trips, increasing mobility and whether favorable comments outweigh negatives, it is not too late to tell the City what you really think about the madcap motorized vehicles that scoot in and out of traffic, around the elderly, baby carriaged and bicycled.







Clean-air construction on public sites in seven years?! Is that the best we can do?

Our City Council and County Commission are preparing to vote in December on their joint proposal for reducing diesel pollution at publicly-funded construction sites.

A public hearing will be held on the Clean Air Construction Standard, December 13 at City Hall.

Following the hearing, the Council and Commission may adopt it as a procurement requirement for contractors on public construction sites.

This is an important step in the overall campaign to reduce diesel emissions, especially their pervasive, ultra-fine and highly dangerous particulates that enter lungs and bloodstreams and find their way to internal organs and even our brains.

While we support this small

foot-in-the-door, we want our leaders to do much better for a healthy Portland.

Join us at City Hall on December 13, at 8:30 am to rally in support of a stronger, more effective Clean Air Construction Standard.

We want our leaders to strengthen the proposed program as follows:

- 1. Compress the phase-in schedule as much as possible.
- 2. Ensure that the oldest, dirtiest diesels will not be allowed to install minimally effective filters and then be grandfathered until they age out or die.
- 3. Expand the program soon to apply to private construction projects assisted by city or county grants.
- 3. Provide clear funding plans to ensure rigorous administration, onsite monitoring and enforcement, and annual public reports.
- 4. Provide incentives and financial assistance for small contractors to comply early with

later requirements in the phase-in period.

The proposal, if adopted, will limit idling and gradually require older diesels to install filters or be replaced. These requirements will be phased in over seven years from the date of adoption, starting with the oldest and dirtiest diesels.

The program will apply only to off-road diesels with 25+ horsepower and to dump trucks and cement trucks serving public construction sites.

If managed well, this initiative may have a positive effect on Portland's overall diesel contractor market. It may also be a model for other cities and counties in Oregon and even for state-funded construction sites.

identified three common ways attackers target online shoppers:

- Using fake websites and emails to get shoppers to share account information Attackers pose as legitimate retailers, or pretend to be a charity, especially during the holidays or after a natural disaster.
- Intercepting insecure transactions If a retailer does not use encryption, attackers may be able to intercept your information during a transaction.
- Targeting vulnerable computers If your computer is not protected, it is vulnerable to being accessed by an attacker who may be able to view your information.

There are simple precautions an online shopper can take to help protect against attackers and fraud. Here are just a few:

- Use a credit card in lieu of a debit card. If a fraudulent transaction takes place on your credit card, at least the funds won't automatically be pulled from your checking account while you are settling the dispute. Protect yourself by only shopping on sites with HTTPS and a padlock icon to the left or right of the URL. The 's' at the end of HTTPS stands for secure and ensures all communication between your browser and the web is encrypted.
- Be proactive. Routinely check all of your financial statements and history for suspicious or questionable charges. Contact your financial institution immediately if you find unauthorized activity on your accounts.
- Don't open attachments or click on URLs in unsolicited emails from vendors and people you don't know. These may be phishing scams that contain links that will download malware on your computer or lure you into entering personal information. Be aware, the email may even appear to be from someone you know but

look or sound suspicious.

- Use strong passwords, and do not use the same passwords for multiple websites. Consider increasing the complexity of passwords or use phrases, and regularly change passwords for added security.
- Most importantly: **Think** before you click. If something seems off, it likely will require a little investigation before clicking the link or message. Resist the urge to respond to enticing subject lines that sound too good to be true. Stay alert and take protective measures to ensure online safety and security.

Two reputable sources for information on protecting your accounts, information and identity from online attackers include: The National Cyber Security Alliance at StaySafeOnline.org and the Department of Homeland Security Cyber Emergency Readiness Team at US-Cert.gov.



Restaurants adjust to new dining trends

As SE Portland's commercial corridors grow and change, so too do the eating habits of residents. Cavier, GrubHub and even Amazon are the future of Portland's food scene according to several SE restaurateurs. One surmises that the Silicon generations' dependence on electronics may be driving the shift.

Diane Santucci opened a branch of Portland's beloved Russell St. BBQ on Belmont St. and says the bulk of her business at the new location is delivery. "Millennials are driving a trend of eating at home," she says. "Maybe it's because they like having unlimited access to their electronics," she muses.

Across the street at the Bite on Belmont food cart pod, Viking Soul Food owner Megan Walhood agrees that delivery is the future. She and many of the carts in the pod such as Herb's Mac and Cheese use an array of delivery services, especially once the weather gets cold and wet. "On a rainy night, delivery services are a great option."

Whether driven by newbies, new growth, new generations or even holiday overload, the ease and convenience of delivery is a draw according to marketing guru

Veronica Anton. Yet, she says, residents who opt out of eating in are missing opportunities. Rewarding experiences come from visiting the quirky restaurants and shops of the Eastside's Main Street style corridors. "People really have to engage with our businesses to get a sense of their personalities," she savs.

Current Belmont Business Association President Constance Ihrke confirms that home and office delivery is growing. "Social media is used to offer specials for walk-ins...We are looking at running some winter promotions in January and or February to increase walk in traffic during the slower months."

In addition to missed social opportunities, delivery surcharges that run as high as 30% can impact businesses on narrow margins and those getting established in new locations. Russell St. BBQ's Santucci says food purveyors have no control over the delivery - how long it takes or in what condition the food arrives.

On the upside, delivery services can offset closures and detours caused by nearby construction. When the Belmont carts had to move across the street to make room for a co-housing facility, delivery services came to the rescue.

Walhood particularly likes

Delivery Dudes, a locally-owned service that charges less than competitors. Business is now back stronger than ever, she says, because the new location's gate offers better security.

"At the other location we had constant break-ins," she said "This is a much better spot."

Established eateries east of SE 39th rely often on breakfast and brunch crowds.

On Hawthorne, established eateries like Bread and Ink also rely on early birds to keep business hearty. Morning fare is almost always eat-on-site. says a worker from the adjacent Waffle Window which has seating inside and a courtyard outside.

Coffeeshops remain loaded, if not packed, with remote workers who consider cafés an extension of their office. During last month's cyber shopping, the original Division Street Stumptown Coffee Shop was swamped with customers using Wi-Fi connections.

Residents are taking heart that the departing Woodsman Tavern will be replaced by Tasty n Sons, relabeling as Tasty n Daughters when it moves from N. Williams Ave. to Division St. Curiosity will likely be a strong on-site attraction.

The Land Use Committee reviewed the land use notice for the Kellogg Middle School Conditional Use Review and Adjustment Review (LU 18-169865 CU AD) and recommended the Board support approval. John Carr drafted a letter in support, and the Board approved, sending it to the City. For more information on the Kellogg Middle School project and to watch a virtual tour of the current design visit southtabor.org.

TriMet's Division Transit Project is close to 60% design complete with the current focus being on bus shelter designs, including how the protected bike path (from SE 82nd east to the Portland city limit) will be integrated into the station/platform to mitigate pedestrian and bike collisions. If federal funding comes through, construction is set to start at the end of 2019.

Look for a few new neighborhood information kiosks to go up in the near future. The kiosks are one of our methods to share information with neighbors.

We have no meeting in December, so our November meeting was the last of 2018. There was recognition of the continued work and gratitude to the commitment of Board members and residents alike.

A full house came out for the RNA meeting November 11 that was chock-full of sharing of local events and happenings, discussion topics relevant to the neighborhood, reflection on our past, and making decisions for our future.

We learned about new heritage tree dedications, Richmond Ready pairing with the SE Portland Tool Library to get roto-hammers for earthquake retrofitting, the new Inner Powell Alliance of neighborhoods wanting to create a safer and more vibrant corridor, and more.

There was a heartfelt presentation about Mulugeta Seraw, who was murdered near our neighborhood 30 years ago. The RNA will host a book group for A Hundred Little Hitlers, which chronicles "The Death of a Black Man, the Trial of a White Racist, and the Rise of the Neo-Nazi Movement in America". Details are on the

After a follow-up discussion of the Moving Forward workshop in October, we were announced that, by using some of the recommendations for how to better ourselves, we found ways to not only build volunteer pools, but also to save thousands yearly for our neighborhood newsletters. We hope to follow up with more of the ideas to find better ideas, better ways of doing things, and increasing our focus on activities with even greater

A great discussion about a proposed Area Parking Permit Program along Division between 28th & 43rd followed. Some residents have serious problems with parking, others don't see any problems, but almost all residents in attendance indicated that they were hesitant to support any program without more details and assurances for where the money from permits would go. The board later voted to not make a decision or recommendation until we had more information from PBOT. Finally we approved a large backlog of procedural items, and approved the proposed Fiscal Sponsorship Applications for local events

There was discussion led by SEUL regarding how to pay for mediation requests for grievances against the board. In the past, the city has paid all costs related to grievances and mediation out of a large pool of money; but that is no longer the case. Mediation requests can cost from hundreds to thousands of dollars per instance, and could be lobbed by anybody at anytime. The RNA Board adopted a policy to require that those requesting mediation are responsible for paying for said mediation, as to prevent grievances and mediations from becoming a tool by those with ill or maligned intent from causing continual harm.



The community did it! The FMTP Stewardship Fund campaign began in April 2018 with the goal of raising \$100,000 to ensure the future ecological health of the park. We reached this goal September 29 at a major fundraising event hosted at the home of Alissa and Neal Keny-Guyer. Funds have been deposited in an FMTP endowment fund with the Oregon Community Foundation where interest accrued will help sustain the volunteer habitat restoration program, the FMTP Weed Warriors, for generations to come.

The campaign will end officially December 31, 2018. We continue to welcome donations because we know that some in the community planned to wait until the end of the year to donate. Recycling tips for December

I remember very clearly the year I received a gift from a friend in a small shiny black lacquered paper box. It had a calligraphy tag, glittery striped ribbon, and was topped with a cluster of crystal ornaments.

It was stunningly beautiful. It took two weeks before I carefully unwrapped my special gift. The mystery, creativity and the time it must have taken made it very special. None of it was particularly holiday material, yet it was festive.

Wrapping gifts has long been what we do to make even ordinary items special. Over the centuries, money, gifts and relics have been wrapped in outer covering for portability, protection and to indicate importance.

Chinese, Korean and Japanese cultures have been noted for wrapping objects in paper to be presented as gifts. In England, the Victorians added ribbons and bows that signaled the wealth, status and taste of the giver.

In the US, gifts commonly were wrapped in plain paper, newsprint, fabric, or in boxes and sacks until things got fancy in 1917.

The Hall Brothers of Kansas City, Missouri, ran out of tissue paper for wrapping purchases in their store. A decision to use patterned paper stock they used for lining envelopes became an instant sensation and sold out.

"Gift wrap" caught on, and the Hall Brothers went on to become Hallmark. Now, a hundred years later, it is estimated that about \$7 billion is spent each year on wrapping paper!

It's totally possible to enjoy wrapping gifts with gorgeous papers and trim and not be wasteful.

Annually, some four million tons of wrapping paper and paper shopping bags get tossed by the end of each holiday season. Simply unwrapping gifts with care and reusing some of the gorgeous paper, bows and ribbons for your gift giving can keep materials from becoming one time use.

Get creative greenery for bows, and alternative wraps such as pillowcases, handkerchiefs, tea towels, jars and tins or other usable objects as containers. Reuse not only your wrapping supplies, but packing and mailing materials before recycling or disposing of them.

Turns out the gift I received in the fancy wrapping was created by someone with a design background. Inside was a lovely candle I enjoyed for years. I held on to the packaging until the right occasion came along, and then presented it to another friend who loved it. I hope it continues to be passed on for others to enjoy.

SES tree recycling event

Portland Street Medicine, a coalition of medical providers, social workers, care managers and lay people who provide care to the homeless, is welcoming the month of December by giving thanks to Splendid Cycles for its gift of a Bullitt cargo bike.

This generous donation, valued at more than \$3,800, helps the all-volunteer nonprofit increase its capacity to serve and carry medical supplies to those living on the streets, in group camps, and out of public sight, in areas often inaccessible by a car.

Portland Street Medicine's partnership with Splendid Cycles (407 SE Ivon St.) began last spring when a team of caregivers were supporting the homeless along the Springwater Corridor trailhead, adjacent to the bike shop. Owners Barb and Joel Grover instantly offered to help.

"We walked through their doors to introduce ourselves and get water and they said, 'We want to help and give you a cargo bike,'" said Drew Grabham, a social worker and co-founder of Portland Street Medicine.



"The scoring starts at 100 and points are then subtracted for infringements on the codes," he

The election and what comes next

Wow. What a difference two years makes.

I still remember Election Night in 2016: leaving a party a little hopeful only to arrive home and turn on my radio to find that Hilary Clinton had conceded. I was pretty gloomy when President Trump was inaugurated into office. While I can't say I've fully shaken that feeling, last month's election has me feeling more optimistic about the future of our country and our democracy.

Αt the federal level, Democrats retook the House of Representatives. Finally, there is a body that will act as a check against the worst of the President's agenda. I was happy to get reelected and even happier that our Governor was re-elected. We beat back some terrible ballot measures. and we now have a Democratic supermajority in both chambers of the State Legislature. Now it is time to get to work.

Here are some of my priorities for the upcoming 2019 legislative session in Salem.

Clean Energy Jobs, formerly Cap and Invest -Ideally, the Federal government would enact a carbon tax creating an economic incentive to stop using fossil fuels and raise money to pay for the needed investments in green energy. For the moment that is not going to happen. Doing something here locally where we team up with California and Canadian Provinces and Northeastern States to reduce carbon emissions is the next best

Right to Repair - Many of us have dealt with the frustration of damaging a smart phone and having to buy a new one. The ability to repair our smart phones should be an option. Unfortunately large corporations keep their repair guides strictly internal, so only that company can fix your device, forcing you to by a new one. This used to be a practice with cars as well, but now any mechanic can pull up the necessary information needed to fix your vehicle. It should be the same for our electronic devices.

Reforming the Kicker - I know this one will have its detractors. Some of us really like getting that extra tax revenue returned, but the Kicker is not good fiscal or good tax policy. It requires the state to guess our tax revenues for two years out, within 2% accuracy. Anything above that must be returned.

For most of us the refund is not that significant and for those for whom it is, they are often wealthy enough, and do not need the additional tax revenue returned to them. I would like to put that extra revenue in our state's rainy day fund instead. That way we aren't caught flatfooted the next time the economy dips and we can avoid the kinds of cuts to schools and healthcare programs we had to make during the Great Recession.


Corporate tax reform Oregon still has among the lowest corporate tax rate in the nation. Addressing this problem is something I've worked on since I got elected to office. We have to use our majorities to get corporations to pay their fair share of taxes so we can invest in schools and important state programs.

Prescription drug costs -Doing something to lower the cost of prescription drugs has been a passion of mine since I was first elected. Last session we made progress on price transparency, but I know we can do more. I'm looking at legislation that could reduce the number of times a company can increase their price in a year, and another bill that would allow us to import drugs from Canada so they could then be sold here in Oregon at lower prices.

Housing housing in our part of the world continues to be an issue. A one size fits all solution is not likely, but the very least we could do is remove the prohibition on local governments from enacting rent stabilization.

There are other issues I'll be working on, including making it easier to vote, reduce the expense of the criminal justice system, giving Portland the ability to lower street speeds on major roads (not just residential ones) and others, but I only get so many words per



Christmas culture in Portland

Christmas has different meanings to different people. To devout Christians, it identifies a celebration of the birth of Christ. To non-Christians and to many others it refers to a time of shopping, holiday decorations, presents and Santa Claus.

In the spirit of political correctness, Portland evidently just has a tree. Funny thing is, the Stimson Lumber tree has an awful lot of Christmas decorations on it and a whole lot of Christmas songs are sung at the tree lighting ceremony.

So, can anyone with the City which owns Pioneer Courthouse Square explain this apparent contradiction? (Probably not.)



important arterials for freight and all modes of transportation. The expectation is to redesign the roadways into one wide travel lane to better accommodate large vehicles, a wide bike lane, and an improved series of pedestrian crossings and bus stops. The anticipated cost for this will be approximately. \$7.8 million.

Belmont and Morrison streets are the central east/west connections through the Central Eastside, serving all types of transportation. Projects will include better bus access and service with new transit islands, pedestrian crossings, and protected bike lanes to reduce accidents by forty percent.

To do this, the transit lane will become a Business Access and Transit (BAT) lane and all parking on the north side of Belmont from SE 12th to Grand Ave. will be removed. The estimated cost will be \$3 million.

Madison, Hawthorne, and Clay are also critical east/west connections serving as feeders to the Hawthorne Bridge. There will be multi-modal improvements to make these streets more efficient. Some of these include transit priority at signals and pedestrian crossing improvements.

Changes in street design will increase the capacity of these streets by forty-six percent. There will be protected bike lanes on portions of Hawthorne and Clay. The parking protected bike lane on the north side of Hawthorne will be dedi-




cated for bus use during rush hours. An all-day BAT lane on SE Madison St. and another BAT lane on Clay from Water to 6th avenues will require the removal of on-street parking. The estimated cost will be \$3.8 million.

One of the over-arching transportation plans for the city is the idea of a six mile Green Loop connecting all parts of the Central City. A linear park, it will connect businesses, residents, workers, tourists, and everyone in the heart of the city. On foot, bike or mobility device, people of all ages, abilities and incomes will be able to get to work, go for a jog, shop, eat, rest, or meet friends in the park via the Green Loop.

It is part of a larger vision to connect parkways to green-ways serving the majority of Portland neighborhoods. City Greenways will get people into the city center for their activities and take them back home easily and efficiently. The Green Loop will connect nearly a dozen distinct districts, each with its own attractions and unique characteristics.

As plans progress, ad-

ditional changes and improvements will be incorporated as determined by the joint efforts of the staff and knowledgeable community citizens familiar with the areas involved. As our streets continue to evolve with the increases in population and employment, our existing Central City transportation infrastructure must change by doing more. The Central City in Motion program will ensure that movement in and through the downtown area remains reliable today and into the future.

Digestive Tips for the Holidays

As we enter the winter holidays, we find our social calendars increasingly busy with work parties, gift exchanges, family gatherings and holiday feasts. Gone are the light, crisp and refreshing foods of the summer as we welcome buttery roasted squashes, creamy mashed potatoes, tender roasts and decadent family recipes and desserts.

For anyone with digestive complaints, such as heartburn, bloating, abdominal fullness, pain, acid reflux or changing stools, these seemingly delicious and indulgent holiday feasts can make these problems worse. Luckily, there are well-researched tips to make the holidays easier to digest.

Heartburn or acid reflux makes enjoying the holidays difficult. Different medicines can provide temporary relief but usually do not treat the cause. To prevent and eliminate reflux all together, avoiding spicy foods, over-eating, and acidic foods, such as tomatoes or coffee, can help for many people.

Licorice root can also help decrease reflux symptoms and heal the stomach from the effects of too much acid. Other times, reflux is caused by too little stomach acid, which can be increased with apple cider vinegar (ACV) or bitter herbs before meals.

Some people who experience reflux, may also have upper abdominal pain, difficultly taking a full breath, or increased anxiety and bloating after meals. I commonly perform a gentle adjustment of the stomach, pulling it down and away from the diaphragm, that can stop the reflux and many other symptoms for weeks to months without medications.

Bloating or distension is a very common complaint, which may be due to small intestine bacterial overgrowth (SIBO) or by not signaling the body for proper digestion. If SIBO is an issue, people may also have rosacea or eczema, restless leg syndrome, multiple food sensitives and changes in mood.

Bloating may also be caused by too little stomach acid, especially in people over 40 years old. Increasing acid production in the stomach before meals with ACV or bitter herbs will decrease bloating and also signal the gallbladder and pancreas to release their enzymes. Think of the stomach as the main messenger for digestion.

Other things that can decrease bloating are strong ginger teas and enteric-coated peppermint oil, which help promote emptying of the stomach and small intestine and move trapped gas. However, both ginger and peppermint can make reflux worse since it relaxes the valve between the stomach and the esophagus.

Changing stool from soft to hard or diarrhea to constipation can also be a sign of SIBO. It may also improve by consuming healthy amounts of water and fiber in the diet and by stimulating proper enzyme production, as mentioned before.

If stools haven't been the same since gallbladder removal, consider decreasing fat intake, using bile support or activated charcoal at least thirty minutes after a meal. Stools can become loose from consuming too much alcohol or foods which may be irritating to the digestive tract.

The holidays can be a time of stress, worry and social overload. It's important to take time throughout the year to check-in with ourselves on our stress levels and feelings of overwhelm. Stress puts the body in a fight-or-flight state, which greatly impacts digestion, mood, sleep and sense of well-being.

Each person has his or her own way of decreasing stress like walking, journaling, exercising, crafting or meeting a close friend for coffee. It's important to find the ways that work best for you individually.

These tips commonly help most people find some relief from their digestive complaints. Take the time, while being patient with yourself, to find what helps you best digest this holiday season.


